From the Rector-

In a world where we have convinced ourselves that all knowledge must be based on observable, measurable, phenomena, the realm of spiritual powers and angelic beings has been relegated to fairy tales and valentine cards; which is, for me, a tremendous shame. But, as we prepare for the Church's Commemoration on the 29th of St. Michael the Archangel and the ministry of all the angels, I think that it's good that there are some things about God's great creation which we can not necessarily understand. It's probably good for us that we cannot define and categorize and analyse everything that God has made; that the God who has made all things, visible and invisible, has made some things beyond our power to measure. There is, to my mind, something profoundly comforting in the knowledge that God has the power not just to create the necessary parts of life but parts which, in all logical ways, seem beyond necessity. So, the message which I hope we can all take home whenever we reflect on the ministry of God's angels is the message that we are never alone because God's Grace is never just sufficient; it is abundant.

The angels as spoken of in Holy Scripture show us where our true happiness and joy are to be found: in the service and presence of God. In a world where people tell us that our happiness will be found in other things, the angels remind us never to sell ourselves, or our lives, so cheaply or so casually. But the angels also call us to share in and imitate their ministry. Christ promises us that the angels have guardianship over all those who believe, and in particular, over little children; that we are protected by their presence and by their ministry. So, in conjunction with the work of all guardian angels, we could do nothing better than to be called by them into the battle of protecting the young and the young at heart; to reach out to shelter those who are marginalised, rejected, forgotten, and abused. They live in our communities. They go to our schools. They are the victims of taunting and bullying, insult and rejection; and they need our help.

But the angels, and St. Michael most of all, call us to share in the battle and the victory of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. It's a battle that's been won once and for all but it's not yet over. In a way, we've been like players who've been sitting on the bench while someone else has won an amazing victory for us. Our hope, though, is to share by membership in the glory of that victory; and even though we were not able to score the winning goal, we just might be able to add to the size and wonder of the victory. Our victory over sin and death, over hopelessness and despair, discouragement and self-destructiveness, and even death, is God's free

gift through our Lord Jesus Christ. We are not alone and we do not fight evil or apathy or hatred alone. "Fear not!" the angel said to Mary. "Fear not!" the angels say to us.




